Denmark definitely delivers amazing wind conditions – the north-western section has the highest wind stats of the entire Northern European continent – and it gets great waves, too. **Else Marie Lehman** is our guide...

hey say size doesn't matter, but they're wrong. Denmark may well be one of Europe's most diminutive domains, but it boasts a BIG shoreline. A quite remarkable 4,600 miles of it, in fact. And, true to Scandinavian geological form, this crenellated coastline is crammed with beaches of every conceivable shape and size, offering something for all windsurfing tastes, no matter how refined or discerning. The sailing areas are spacious, too, so there's plenty of room to stretch out, and crowds are not a problem. As for the windsurfing, well, let's just say that conditions are so good here that many locals refer to the area as "Cold Hawaii" ...

The Winds of Change

The Danish windsurfing season starts in April May and runs until September / October, with winds ranging from very light to occasional storm-force. Varying wind conditions are a characteristic of Denmark and Northern Europe – wind speed and direction can change fast, and there will rarely be two days the same. But because Denmark is such a small country you will always be close to a place with perfect wind for your needs, whether its at an east, west, north or south-facing beach. The closest coast will always be less than an hour away, regardless of where you are in the country, which adds up to minimum time on the road and maximum time on the water.

Wave Lovers Rejoice

Although most Danish waves are windblown, groundswell is also frequent; either way, there's always a good wavesailing session to be had.

The number one area for wave lovers is the est coast in Jutland (Jylland) and the eighbouring North Sea. From Vejers in the outh to Hirtshals up north, great spots roliferate, and you're spoilt for choice.

The pros and more experienced windsurfers lock to Klitmøller in the northern part of the west coast. (There are several beaches in this area, but Klitmøller Bay is the main one for vindsurfers.) Wave conditions are incredibly varied up here as they are so wind-dependent, and every day will be a new - and fun experience. You'll need to be careful of the currents though, as they can be treacherous.

Klitmøller hosts several competitions and gettogethers for wave lovers. For anyone who's anything in the business it's THE place to be.

Challenges at All Levels

If you're travelling with a group of mixed ability windsurfers the best area to head for is Hvide Sande. For experienced sailors it offers huge fun and great challenges on the North Sea side, where you'll find some of the hardest shorebreaks in the country, while the less experienced (or less brave!) will enjoy the shallower and quieter waters of Ringkøbing


Dogs Tricks

Denmark isn't just for seasoned hard-core windsurfers seeking surf and high wind action. If you're just getting started in the sport there are plenty of perfect places for you as well.

There are windsurfing schools all over the country, so if you're in the early learning stages, or maybe a bit rusty after some time off the water, you'll have no problems finding tuition to meet your requirements. Prices depend on the number of days / hours and level of course, so check with the various schools to find what seems best for you - and your wallet. If you're way past the basics and just need to fine-tune your technique a bit, private tuition can also be arranged.

Metro Surf

Windsurfing in Denmark can easily be combined with a little metropolitan excitement. The closest spot to the capital city of Copenhagen is the recently established Amager Strandpark, which works best when →

winds are between north-east and south-east. It's a good spot for beginners and intermediates. Other places for those staying at Sealand (Sjælland) are Ishøj and Lynæs.

If you're looking for wave spots head either north to Liseleje and Gilleleje, or south to picturesque Møn. The water in the Møn area has a unique colour thanks to the amount of chalk from the surrounding cliffs.

The Smallprint (and a Little Motherly Advice)

The bottom line is that windsurfing is allowed at most places – sea and inlets – in Denmark. It's only prohibited in a few protected wildlife breeding grounds, which is cool with windsurfers because they're a pretty environmentally aware bunch anyway. Danes in particular are considerate people, and they always appreciate visitors who follow suit –

whether the courtesy is extended to animals and nature, or to each other.

Denmark has numerous high quality campsites where you can stay at very affordable prices and have full access to all basic necessities. Camping on beaches, in fields or in parking areas isn't allowed, so even though you may be willing to forgo campsite conveniences it's best avoided as it tends to result in fines, upset locals and unpleasant hassle.

B&Bs and hostels are easy to come by too and bills aren't too scary, but unless your visit is completely off-season a reservation is highly recommended.
